NEW ORLEANS SAINTS (8-3) SEEK TO WIN FOURTH IN A ROW VS. DETROIT LIONS (7-4)

Fresh off a dominating 49-24 victory over the New York Giants on their 2011 Monday Night Football debut, the Saints (8-3) will host a second consecutive prime time contest when they face the Detroit Lions (7-4) on Sunday, Dec. 4 at 7:20 p.m. CT. at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. The Giants victory gives the Saints their third straight win and fourth in five games.

New Orleans never trailed the Giants as the Saints took advantage of an interception in the end zone by LB **Will Herring** and converted it into their first scoring drive of the day in the second quarter when QB **Drew Brees** found WR **Lance Moore** for a four-yard touchdown. Brees finished the day completing 24 of 38 passes for 363 yards with four touchdown passes, while rushing for another. TE **Jimmy Graham** tied for the team lead in both receptions (5) and scoring grabs (2), while leading the team with 84 receiving yards. RB **Mark Ingram**

led a Saints rushing attack that grinded out 205 yards with 80 yards and a 35-yard TD.

The Lions are looking to rebound after dropping their annual Thanksgiving contest to the Green Bay Packers 27-15 at Ford Field.

The Saints and Lions have met 20 times, with New Orleans holding a 10-9-1 edge. The Saints have won the last two contests. The last time these two squads met was on Sept. 13, 2009 when New Orleans claimed a season-opening 45-27 victory in the Superdome, a win that would propel them in their championship campaign.

In the NFC South this week: With five regular season games left, the Saints are one game ahead in the NFC South of the Atlanta Falcons (7-4). The Falcons travel to the AFC South leading Houston Texans (8-3) this Sunday. The Carolina Panthers (3-8) will travel to face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (4-7) on the road.

THE COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 57-34 regular season record and a 4-2 postseason mark, guiding the team to the Super Bowl XLIV championship. He's the club's lone head coach to open a season with 13 straight wins and post a 13-game win streak, and has the franchise's top winning percentage (.626). Since 2006, the Saints have the second-best winning percentage in the NFC, fifth in the NFL. Payton's 29-16 (.644) home record and 28-18 (.609) road mark are the club's top winning percentages. He's recorded a 43-25 (.632) mark vs. NFC opponents. Since taking over, the Saints have the best record among NFC South teams. In 2006, he took the Saints to the NFC Championship and was named NFL Coach of the Year by most major outlets. Calling offensive plays, the Saints are one of only two teams to finish in the top 10 in net yards per game each season since 2006. Payton was hired as New Orleans' 14th head coach on Jan. 18, 2006, after serving on the Dallas Cowboys staff from 2003-2005. Prior to joining the Cowboys, Payton served on the New York Giants staff from 1999-2002, including the final three seasons as offensive coordinator. His tenure was highlighted by a Super Bowl berth in his first full season as coordinator. Payton's prior NFL coaching experience came as quarterbacks coach for Philadelphia from 1997-98.

Detroit Coach **Jim Schwartz** is in his third season as head coach of the Lions. Schwartz came to Detroit following ten seasons on the staff of the Tennessee Titans, including the past eight as defensive coordinator. Before joining the Titans, he spent three seasons as a defensive assistant with the Baltimore Ravens, starting his career in the NFL as a scout when the team was located in Cleveland.

HISTORY

This will be the third game for Coach **Sean Payton** vs. the Lions since he was hired as head coach of New Orleans in 2006. The first two contests have been 45-7 and 45-27 victories in 2008 and 2009 respectively

The all-time regular season series has the Saints leading 10-9-1, with the first game in the series ending in a 20-20 tie on Nov. 24, 1968 at Detroit's Tiger Stadium. The two clubs split all ten meetings from 1970-89. The longest win streak in the series for either club is three games. Most of the games in the series have been extremely close, with 11 contests between the two clubs being decided by a touchdown or less. The Saints are 5-1 in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome against Detroit. A look back at the results in games between the two clubs :

2011 GAME SUPERLATIVES REVIEW

WEEK 1: Green Bay Packers 42, Saints 34; September 8, 2011 @ Lambeau Field – New Orleans fell to the Packers in the NFL's kickoff contest, despite rebounding from a third quarter 15-point deficit to be withing a touchdown and two-point conversion at the Green Bay one-yard line for an untimed play following a pass interference penalty. New Orleans was also aided by a second quarter dramatic 72-yard punt return for a touchdown by RB **Darren Sproles**, but the Saints would be victimized by losing the turnover battle, some struggles on short yardage and an explosive Packers offense.

New Orleans QB **Drew Brees** completed 32 of 49 passes for 419 yards with three touchdown passes. Sproles led the Saints with 250 all-purpose yards, which would be the most by a Saint since 2008 and the second-highest week one NFL total.

Packers QB **Aaron Rodgers** completed 27 of 35 passes for 312 yards with three touchdown passes. Green Bay WR **Greg Jennings** recorded seven catches for 89 yards with one touchdown. Packers RB **James Starks** rushed 12 times for 57 yards, including a second quarter 17-yard touchdown burst.

- New Orleans outgained Green Bay in total net yardage 477-399, but the Packers held the ball for 32:54 of the contest in winning the time of possession battle.

- In his Saints debut, Sproles led the Saints in receiving (7 catches for 75 yards), while his 72-yard punt return for a score was the third of his career, also running back a kickoff 57 yards.

- WR **Devery Henderson** added six receptions for 100 yards and a 100-yard TD, the first time he reached the century mark since 2009.

- S **Roman Harper** led the Saints with ten tackles (seven solo) and also split a sack of Rodgers with DE **Junior Galette**

- The Saints fell to 7-15 against the Packers in the all-time series, losing to Green Bay for the first time to them since 2005.

- The Saints had two rookies in the starting lineup on opening day (Ingram and DE **Cameron Jordan**) for the first time since the 2008 season (DE **Sedrick Ellis** and CB **Tracy Porter**).

WEEK 2: Saints 30, Chicago Bears 13; Sept. 18, 2011 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints got in the win column for the 2011 season with an impressive effort on offense, defense and special teams.

The Saints defense surrendered only 246 yards of total offense, sacked Bears QB **Jay Cutler** six times and stopped the Bears on all but two of their third down attempts (2-12).

After trailing 7-0 in the first quarter, the Saints scored 16 unanswered points in the second half and widened what was a six-point halftime lead (16-10) to a 17-point lead as they surrendered only three points in the second half. QB **Drew Brees** threw three scores and scored on an eight yard TD run to stake the Saints to a commanding lead.

- Brees would complete 26-of-37 passes on the day for 270 yards with three touchdown passes and a passer rating of 118.1.

- DE **Junior Galette** and S **Roman Harper** had two sacks apiece in an effort that saw six takedowns. DE **Turk McBride** had his first sack as a Saint in the third quarter and forced Cutler to fumble, as LB **Jonathan Vilma** recovered for the Saints. Five plays later, New Orleans would score a touchdown off the third quarter turnover.

- WR **Devery Henderson** had three receptions for a team-leading 103 yards (34.3 avg.), including a 79-yard touchdown reception. It was the second straight game that Henderson reached the century mark in yardage, the second time in his career he has done so and first since 2006

- The Saints defense surrendered a only 246 total net yards. They held Chicao to only 60 yards on the ground, as starting RB **Matt Forte** rushed for only 49 yards on ten carries. S **Roman Harper** led the team with six tackles (five solo).

- Brees' 79-yard scoring throw to Henderson opened up a 13-point second quarter that extended New Orleans' lead to 16-7.

- K **John Kasay** kicked three field goals, giving him 438 for his career and moving him past **Jason Elam** for sixth place in NFL history. Kasay's 53-yard field goal in the second quarter was the 41st field goal of 50 or more yards in his career, breaking a tie with former Saint **Morten Andersen** for second place all-time in NFL history. **Jason Hanson** (45 entering today) holds the NFL record for most field goals of 50 or more yards.



2011 GAME SUPERLATIVES REVIEW

WEEK 3: Saints 40, Houston Texans 33; Sept. 25, 2011 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints rolled up over 450 yards in total offense, while the New Orleans defense held one of the NFL's most prolific offenses to field goals on three of four possessions inside the 20, while recording a key fourth quarter turnover that provided fuel to a dramatic comeback and improved New Orleans' record to 2-1.

QB **Drew Brees** led an assault through the air, completing 31 of 44 passes to eight different players for 370 yards and three touchdown passes, while WR **Lance Moore** led the club in receiving with nine catches for 98 yards, including a fourth quarter 16-yard TD. On his scoring drive, he caught four passes from Brees as well as a two-point conversion. TE **Jimmy Graham** had four receptions for a team-leading 100 yards receiving with one touchdown.

RB **Mark Ingram** carried nine times for 38 yards, as his fourth quarter 13-yard touchdown run with 2:42 left put the Saints up for good.

The swarming New Orleans defense caused Houston QB **Matt Schaub** to throw an interception to CB **Jabari Greer** in the fourth quarter, which set up Moore's scoring grab. After Ingram's touchdown, the Texans had the ball one more time, but a sack by CB **Leigh Torrence** for a loss of six yards on third down created a fourth-and-21 situation.

• LB **Jo-Lonn Dunbar** started at middle linebacker in place of an injured **Jonathan Vilma** and led the Saints with 12 tackles (nine solo), while CB **Jabari Greer's** fourth quarter interception return gave the Saints the ball back in Houston territory to set up a touchdown. In addition to his pick, Greer posted three solo tackles and two pass defenses.

• WR **Robert Meachem's** third-quarter touchdown reception was the 20th of his career, breaking a tie with teammate **Devery Henderson** to take over sole possession of tenth place on the Saints career list.

• For the first time in franchise history, the Saints have scored 30 points in their first three contests.

• The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. Houston to 2-1, making the Texans the eighth team that the Saints have an all-time winning record against.

WEEK 4: Saints 23, Jacksonville Jaguars 10; Oct. 2, 2011 @ EverBank Field – The Saints posted an impressive victory against the Jets behind a powerful running game and a relentless pass rush.

For the first time in 2011, the Saints scored on their first drive, taking a 7-0 lead on a one-yard TD run by FB **Jed Collins** on his first offensive touch. The Saints defense then proceeded to clamp down on rookie Jaguars QB **Blaine Gabber** as he was picked off by CB **Patrick Robinson** and sacked three times, while allowing him to complete only 16 of 42 passes for 196 yards with a 51.3 passer rating.

QB **Drew Brees** completed 31 of 43 passes for 351 yards with one touchdown as the Saints ran up 177 yards on the ground. RBE **Darren Sproles** led the club in rushing with 75 yards on 10 carries. TE **Jimmy Graham** enjoyed a career-day in most categories as he had ten receptions for 132 yards with one TD, including a career-long 59-yard grab.

DE **Will Smith** led the pass rush with two sacks, while S **Roman Harper** added a takedown and a team-high eight tackles (five solo). CB **Patrick Robinson** had the first pick of his NFL career.

• The Saints held the Jaguars to 274 net yards, the second time this season they have held an opponent to under 300 yards. Surrendering only 84 yards rushing to Jaguars RB **Maurice Jones-Drew**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last six regular season games.

• With 132 yards receiving, Graham had the first back-to-back 100-yard games by a New Orleans tight end since **Henry Childs** in 1978.

• Smith's two sacks were the 12th time in his eight-year career that he has posted more than one quarterback takedown.

• The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. Jacksonville to 3-2, making the Jaguars the ninth team that the Saints have an all-time winning record against.

• With the Saints having now won their last three games, New Orleans has enjoyed their sixth win streak of at least three contests since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006.

• Brees threw at least one touchdown pass for the 31st consecutive regular season game, giving him the third-longest such streak in NFL record books.

2011 GAME SUPERLATIVES REVIEW

WEEK 5: Saints 30, Carolina Panthers 27; October 9, 2011 @ Bank of America Stadium – The Saints rebounded from a fourth quarter four point deficit with a dramatic comeback when QB **Drew Brees** found RB **Pierre Thomas** for a six-yard touchdown with 50 seconds remaining.

The Saints first jumped out to a 10-0 first quarter lead compliments of a one-yard scoring grab by FB **Jed Collins**, which was set up by a 25-yard interception return by CB **Patrick Robinson** on the game's first play from scrimmage and a 23-yard field goal by K **John Kasay** as he kicked for the first time against his former team.

Carolina got on the board when rookie QB **Cam Newton** found WR **Steve Smith** for a 54-yard touchdown pass and although the Saints took a 17-6 lead when 2009 Heisman Trophy winner **Mark Ingram** scored a one-yard touchdown to answer the 2010 winner's big play, the Panthers got right back in the game on a 69-yard scoring run by RB **DeAngelo Williams**. Kasay drilled a 46-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to go into halftime with a 20-13 lead.

After a third Kasay field goal on New Orleans' first possession of the second half extended the lead to ten points, Newton followed up with a one-yard touchdown run and then found TE **Greg Olsen** for a five-yard touchdown to give Dallas their first lead of the game with under 12:32 left in the game.

Both clubs traded unsuccessful drives before Brees then went on a 13-play, 89-yard drive that included a screen play to Thomas that resulted in an 18-yard gain and then the game-winning touchdown pass, as well as a key third down throw to TE **Jimmy Graham** and a two-yard rush by Ingram on third-and-one.

Brees completed 32 of 45 passes for 359 yards with two touchdowns and one interception as he's tied an NFL record by throwing for at least 350 yards in three consecutive contests. Graham led the Saints in receiving with eight receptions for 129 yards as he became the first Saints tight end to have 100 receiving yards in three consecutive contests.

- S **Malcolm Jenkins** led the Saints with six solo tackles, while DT **Sedrick Ellis** and DE **Will Smith** split a sack and Smith forced a fumble

- Graham's 129-yard performance, marked the third straight week he had at least 100 yards receiving, the first such accomplishment for a tight end in franchise history and only the fourth time a Saint has done this.

WEEK 6: Tampa Bay Buccaneers 26, Saints 20; October 16, 2011 @ Raymond James Stadium – Three interceptions, including one in the fourth quarter that helped keep Tampa Bay's six-point lead, resulted in a hard-fought 26-20 loss despite a stellar effort by the Saints to rebound from a 20-7 deficit to come within three points.

The Saints came back from a 20-7 deficit to move to within three at 23-20 in the fourth quarter when QB **Drew Brees** found WR **Lance Moore** for a 40-yard reception and then RB **Mark Ingram** had a 12-yard touchdown run.

After the defense got the Buccaneers off the field, the Saints had a three-and-out and then the defense surrendered a field goal, but they had control of the football at their own four yard-line with 3:24 left in the game when Brees was intercepted by Buccaneers LB **Quincy Black** in the end zone.

Three plays later, Buccaneers QB **Josh Freeman** hit WR **Dezmon Briscoe** with a pass for a 17-yard gain that after a New Orleans challenge on the pass completion ruling was upheld. The Saints defense would have one more opportunity to try to get Tampa off the field but RB **Ernest Graham** had a 12-yard run to midfield for a first down that would allow the Bucs to run out the clock.

Brees completed 29 of 45 passes for 383 yards with a touchdown throw to WR **Marques Colston**. Ingram had nine carries for 22 yards to go with his 12-yard TD.

Freeman completed 23-of-41 passes for 303 yards with two touchdown passes. Graham carried 17 times for 109 yards.

- S **Malcolm Jenkins** had 13 tackles, the most by a Saint in 2011.

- The Saints allowed Tampa Bay to convert only 4-of-14 third down attempts (29%).

- TE **Jimmy Graham** had seven receptions for 124 yards as he became the first Saints to have 100-yards receiving in four consecutive games and joined **Tony Gonzalez** as the only other NFL tight end to do so since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger .

- WR **Marques Colston**'s first quarter 38-yard touchdown reception was part of a day where the Saints had dual 100-yard receivers for the first time since 2009 as he posted seven grabs for 118 yards.

- T **Zach Strief** was inactive due to a sprained MCL for the third straight game. C **Olin Kreutz** returned to the lineup after missing two games with a knee injury.

2011 GAME SUPERLATIVES REVIEW

WEEK 7: Saints 62, Indianapolis Colts 7; October 23, 2011 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints jumped back into sole possession of first place in the NFC South with an impressive effort on offense, defense and special teams. The point total on the nationally televised Sunday night contest set a club record and was tied for the highest total since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

The Saints defense had a season-high three takeaways, including a fourth quarter 72-yard interception return for a touchdown. DE **Cameron Jordan** and LB **Jonathan Vilma** recovered fumbles. The three turnovers resulted in 21 points.

The Saints started the game by scoring 21 points in the first quarter, setting a club-record in first quarter scoring. The lead was widened to 31-7 before the Colts scored their only touchdown of the game and then New Orleans outscored Indianapolis 28-0 in the second half. QB **Drew Brees** threw five touchdown passes and had a passer rating of 144.9 to stake the Saints to their commanding lead.

- Brees would complete 31 of 35 passes on the day for 325 yards with five touchdown passes, two apiece to WR **Marques Colston** and TE **Jimmy Graham** and one to RB **Darren Sproles**, who added another rushing score. He had a passer rating of 144.9. It was the fourth such game of Brees' career with five TDs and no picks, tying Tom Brady and Peyton Manning for the most in NFL history. It was the 32nd NFL game in which a player passed for at least 300 yards with five or more TD passes and no INTs. Brees' completion percentage (88.6%, 31-for-35) is the highest in any of those 32 games.

- LB **Jonathan Casillas**, recorded five tackles (two solo) and sacked Indianapolis QB **Curtis Painter** for a five-yard loss on a third down play in the second quarter, his third takedown of the season.

- Colston had seven receptions for 98 yards with two touchdowns, leading the club in both catches and yardage.

- New Orleans won the turnover battle 3-0. On Indianapolis' first drive, LB **Jonathan Vilma** picked up a fumbled snap exchange. Later in the first quarter DT **Tom Johnson** forced a fumble by Colts RB **Delone Carter** and it was picked up by Jordan.

- In addition to setting a club scoring record, they also set records for margin of victory, first downs (36) and PATs (eight).

WEEK 8: St. Louis Rams 31, Saints 21; October 30, 2011 @ Edward Jones Dome – A blocked punt and interception near the end of the second quarter, helped produce 14 points for the previous winless Rams that helped them stake a 17-0 halftime lead against New Orleans that would be too much to overcome

Following a scoreless first quarter, a drive where St. Louis made a pair of key third down conversions resulted in a 38-yard field goal by Rams K **Josh Brown**.

The Rams built on their lead when DE **Robert Quinn** blocked a punt by P **Thomas Morstead**, putting the Rams in position for a three-yard touchdown run by RB **Steve Jackson**. On New Orleans' next offensive play, QB **Drew Brees** was intercepted by Rams CB **Josh Gordy**. With 17 seconds left in the half, St. Louis QB **A.J. Feeley** flicked an eight-yard scoring throw to WR **Brandon Lloyd** to give the Rams a 17-0 halftime lead.

However, New Orleans showed persistence in trying to rebound from a 24-0 third quarter deficit, when S **Malcolm Jenkins** sacked Rams QB **A.J. Feeley** and forced him to fumble, the ball picked up by LB **Jonathan Vilma** in the end zone for a touchdown. The New Orleans defense then quickly forced a three-and-out, got the ball back for the offense who engineered a 10-play, 68-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown run by RB **Pierre Thomas**. The Saints remained in the contest until late in the fourth quarter when a pass by QB **Drew Brees** was picked off by Rams S **Darian Stewart** and returned 27 yards for the game-clinching touchdown.

- The Saints outgained the Rams 323-283, but St. Louis won the turnover battle against New Orleans 2-1.

- Brees completed 30 of his 44 attempts for 269 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. He's now thrown a scoring pass in 35 straight games, behind Johnny Unitas (47) and Brett Favre (36).

- WR **Lance Moore** led all receivers with eight receptions for 82 yards (10.3 avg.) with a fourth quarter touchdown grab.

- **Pierre Thomas** got the start at running back and his fourth quarter three-yard touchdown run put New Orleans within ten.

- DE **Will Smith** had five solo tackles and two sacks. His two quarterback takedowns, marked the eighth time in his career and second time in 2011 that he had a pair in a contest.

WEEK 9: Saints 27, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 16; November 6, 2011 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – A complete effort of the season on offense, defense, special teams helped New Orleans split the season series with their NFC South rivals. The 27-16 victory improved the Saints' record to 6-3 heading into a week 10 showdown in Atlanta

New Orleans rolled to 453 yards of total offense while allowing Tampa Bay to convert only two-of-12 third down attempts. The Saints held the Buccaneers to 84 yards rushing, while New Orleans churned out 195 yards on the ground.

The Saints scored 14 straight points in the first and second quarters, courtesy of **Drew Brees** touchdown passes to WR **Lance Moore** and RB **Darren Sproles**. The two clubs traded field goals later in the second quarter for New Orleans to enter halftime with a 17-3 edge.

After an interception by Tampa Bay CB **Ronde Barber** helped set up a field goal to put the Buccaneers within 11 points, the Saints put together a 12-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a nine-yard touchdown run by RB **Pierre Thomas**.

Brees was efficient as he completed 27-of-36 passes for 258 yards, two touchdowns and a 101.4 passer rating. TE **Jimmy Graham** led the Saints in receiving with six receptions for 78 yards.

- The New Orleans defense allowed Tampa Bay to convert only two-of-12 (16.7) third down conversions, equalling their prior season-best with a performance vs. Chicago, Sept. 18. The defense also made an impressive fourth down stops in a fourth and one situation from the Saints 29, when S **Roman Harper** and LB **Jonathan Casillas** stopped RB **LeGarrette Blount** for a five-yard loss and change of possession that would set up New Orleans' first touchdown.

- Casillas and Harper tied for the team lead in stops with ten tackles apiece, while Harper also added a sack and forced fumble.

- The Saints converted 5-of-10 third down attempts (50%).

- TE **Jimmy Graham** led the Saints in receiving with six receptions for 78 yards. Graham's 87.8 yards per game average through nine games is threatening **Kellen Winslow's** NFL record 94.7 in 1984 for a tight end. Moore had the 25th touchdown reception of his career.

- WR **Marques Colston** had five grabs for 52 yards to become the third Saint to pass the 400-catch mark.

WEEK 10: Saints 26, Atlanta Falcons 23 OT; November 13, 2011 @ The Georgia Dome – QB Drew Brees tossed two touchdown passes and two big plays from the defense in overtime set up K **John Kasay's** game-winning field goal and helped lead the Saints to a 26-23 victory over the Atlanta Falcons. With the win, the 7-3 Saints entered their week 11 bye with a one-and-half game NFC South lead over their rivals to the Northeast.

The Saints' defense allowed Atlanta to convert only five-of-16 third down (31%) attempts and forced them to kick field goals on all three of their trips inside the 20-yard line.

Brees was impressive and precise the entire afternoon, completing 30-of-43 passes for 322 yards, two touchdown throws and a 106.9 passer rating.

WR **Marques Colston** had eight receptions for 113 yards, all of which went for first downs and three of which occurred on third down. TE **Jimmy Graham** had seven receptions for 82 yards and shook off a couple of early drops with a second quarter 21-yard touchdown reception. WR **Robert Meachem** had catches for 36- and 33-yards with his second going for a third quarter touchdown.

LB **Scott Shanle** picked off Atlanta QB **Matt Ryan** for a 12-yard interception return in the first play in the fourth quarter to stop a potential scoring drive. On Atlanta's final possession in overtime on a fourth-and-inches play from their 29-yard line, S **Malcolm Jenkins**, DT **Shaun Rogers** and DE **Will Smith** helped snuff out a rush by Falcons RB **Michael Turner** to give the Saints the ball back and help set up the game-winning field goal.

- Brees threw a touchdown pass in the 37th consecutive game, putting him past **Brett Favre** for sole possession of second place for the longest streak in NFL history. **Johnny Unitas** holds the record with 47.

- S **Roman Harper** finished with a career-high 16 tackles (11 solo), in addition to an eight-yard sack and a pass defense as he captured NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors. Harper has a team-best 6.5 quarterback takedowns, the third-highest single-season sack total by a defensive back in NFL history

- LB **Scott Shanle** finished with nine tackles (seven solo), a fourth quarter 13-yard interception return and one pass defense.

- The Saints now have a 9-2 record against the Falcons since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006.

WEEK 12: Saints 49, New York Giants 24; November 28, 2011 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints ran their win streak to three games with an impressive effort on offense and defense in a primetime showdown with New York. The Saints averaged an impressive 8.4 yards per an offensive play in a performance highlighted by big plays by QB **Drew Brees** and his perimeter players, while a ferocious pass rush and outstanding effort by the defensive backfield harassed Giants QB **Eli Manning**.

LB **Will Herring** in his most significant action to date recorded a first quarter interception in the end zone that turned into a scoring drive that resulted in the first points of the evening in a four-yard touchdown pass from QB **Drew Brees** to WR **Lance Moore**.

After the Giants would kick a field goal, the Saints scored two straight second quarter touchdowns to extend their lead to 21-3 and led going into halftime 21-10 against the NFC East co-leaders. Brees threw four touchdown passes, ran for another and had a passer rating of 129.3 to stake the Saints to a commanding lead they would not surrender.

- Brees would complete 24 of 38 passes on the evening for 363 yards with four touchdown passes He had a passer rating of 129.6. Brees became the first quarterback in Saints history with four passing TDs and one rushing TD in a game. According to ESPN, Brees is the first quarterback in the 42-year history of Monday Night Football with 350 or more passing yards, four passing TDs and a rushing TD in one game.

- DE **Will Smith** recorded one sack, contributing to a line up front that only allowed the Giants to rush for 73 yards.

- TE **Jimmy Graham** and WR **Lance Moore** each had two touchdown receptions apiece.

- The Saints finished with 577 total yards, the second-highest total in franchise history behind a 595-yard effort in 2006 against Cincinnati.

- Monday night's attendance of 73,068 is the largest ever to see a Saints game in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. The previous high of 73,043 was set on Nov. 6 against Tampa Bay. The capacity of the Dome was increased by approximately 3,000 in a renovation completed prior to this season.

SEAN PAYTON NOTES

Since he was named head coach in 2006, the Saints have enjoyed a significant turnaround under Payton, leading them to three postseason appearances and the Super Bowl XLIV title, posting a 57-34 (.626) regular season record and 4-2 postseason mark. He holds the top winning percentage for a Saints coach all-time. Only one NFC team has won more games during this period and only four AFC clubs have more victories.

Payton's home (29-16, .644) and road (28-18, .609) winning percentages are tops in club history. He's recorded a 43-25 (.632) mark vs. NFC opponents. New Orleans' 20-14 division record is best in the NFC South. Under his supervision, the offense has been ranked first in yards per game three of the last five seasons.

New Orleans have excelled in the spotlight under Payton. 9 of the club's 14 Monday Night Football wins have occurred since 2006, posting a 13-6 primetime record since he was hired. The Saints are the only NFC South club to capture two division titles since 2006.

WIN STREAKS

After starting 13-0 in 2009, which marked the club's longest winning streak and best start, New Orleans put together a six-game winning streak in 2010. Under Payton, the Saints have put together seven win streaks of at least three games and four of at least four, including the club's three- and four-game runs in 2011. DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

In 2010, New Orleans won at least ten games for the third time since Payton became head coach and for the second straight season for the first time since 1991-1992. It was only the second time that the Saints posted back-to-back 11-win campaigns. The Saints will be attempting to have double digit wins in three consecutive seasons for the first time in franchise history in 2011.

DOMEFIELD ADVANTAGE

In 2010, the Saints posted a 5-3 record at home and are 5-0 in 2011, joining Baltimore and Green Bay as the only three NFL teams undefeated at home. They have also started our 5-0 at home for only the second time in franchise history, but for the second time in three years after starting 6-0 in 2009. For the first time since the period between 1989-1992, the Saints have posted home winning records in four consecutive seasons. Since 2008, the Saints have posted a 22-7 home regular season record, tied for fourth in the NFL.

BEST IN NOVEMBER

Since Payton became head coach, the Saints have posted a 17-6 (.739) record in the month of November. Since 2008, the Saints have posted the NFL's best record in the month with a 13-2 mark, winning their last 11 games in November, including closing out this past month with a 3-0 record after beating the Giants.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

The Saints have 11 players who have moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, nine who spent time on the Saints practice roster.

The most notable member of the group is WR **Lance Moore**. After spending most of 2005 and 2006 on the club's practice squad, he's evolved into one of the team's leading playmakers with 27 career touchdown catches to tie for fifth place in club record Books. Once again in 2011, he's among the club's receiving leaders with 39 receptions for 440 yards (11.3 avg.) with five scoring grabs.

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Philadelphia in 2008, FB **Jed Collins** spent parts of the last three seasons on the practice squads of the Eagles, Cleveland, Arizona, Chicago and finally in New Orleans for most of the 2010 campaign before he won the lead blocking job out of 2011 training camp and has scored three touchdowns, while blocking for the NFL's top-ranked offense, which has improved their rushing rank from 28th in 2010 to eighth in 2011.

LB **Jo-Lonn Dunbar** started his NFL career on the club's practice squad in 2008 and has become a contributor on defense and special teams. He's appeared in 48 games with 23 starts and made 142 tackles (80

solo) with one sack, eight pass defenses, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and 35 special teams stops. In 2011, he has started ten games at both middle and strongside linebacker and is ranked third on the team in tackles with 69 stops (42 solo), three pass defenses, two forced fumbles and three special teams tackles.

C/G **Brian de la Puente** has broken through in 2011, after spending most of his first three NFL seasons on practice squads, including most of 2010 with New Orleans. After making the 53-man roster out of training camp, he's assumed starting center duties, opening up seven games in the middle for the league's top-ranked offense in net yards per game

After starting his NFL career on Atlanta's practice squad, CB **Leigh Torrence** has found a home in the Saints secondary and on their special teams units. Often serving nickel or dime duty the last four seasons, the former Stanford standout has recorded 51 stops (38 solo), 2.5 sacks, two interceptions, including a 42-yard return for a touchdown and eight pass defenses, while he's posted 61 special teams stops in his six-year NFL career, leading the team with eight in 2011.

S **Jonathon Amaya** was originally signed by Miami as an undrafted free agent out of Nevada in 2010. After spending the first six weeks of the season on the Dolphins practice squad, Amaya led the team with 15 special teams stops in just ten games. Acquired by the Saints in a trade on the eve of training camp, Amaya's ranked second on the club with seven special teams stops in 2011, while also providing depth at the strong safety position behind **Roman Harper**.

Originally signed by the Washington Redskins as an undrafted free agent in 2009 following a standout college career at the University of Missouri, QB **Chase Daniel** chose to join the Saints practice squad on the eve of the regular season. For the last two campaigns, Daniel has served as **Drew Brees**' backup while also serving as the club's holder on field goal and extra point attempts.

Originally drafted by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2002 NFL Draft, TE **John Gilmore** was cut by the Saints at the conclusion of training camp and latched on to the Chicago practice squad for what would be the start of what has evolved into a ten-year NFL career, where he's served as a reliable option in the passing game and a solid blocker in the run game. Gilmore has appeared in 141 career games with 35 starts and has recorded 53 receptions for 533 yards (10.1 avg.) with five touchdowns. Signed by New Orleans prior to the start of the regular season, Gilmore has appeared in ten games with two starts and has recorded a nine-yard reception, while making an impact with his blocking in the run game.

BUCKING THE ODDS

Players whose names are not called in the seven-round NFL draft often face challenging odds in sticking on a team. Yet, the Saints roster features 17 who have bucked convention. Among of the most club's notable undrafted players are Moore, Dunbar, de la Puente, Torrence, Collins, Amaya, Daniel S **Isa Abdul-Quddus**, LB **Jonathan Casillas**, DE **Jeff Charleston**, DE **Junior Galette**, CB **Jabari Greer**, RB **Chris Ivory** and RB **Pierre Thomas**.

After making the club's 53-man opening day roster as an undrafted free agent out of Fordham, Abdul-Quddus has played a key role in the club's special teams units with seven tackles, to tie for second on the squad and two forced fumbles.

Originally signed undrafted in 2009 out of Wisconsin, Casillas started two games and played a key role on special teams as a rookie. Fully recovered from a 2010 foot injury suffered in the preseason finale that cost him the entire season after pushing for a starting role, Casillas is ranked third on the club with three sacks in 2011 and is also among club leaders with 48 tackles (29 solo) with three pass defenses.

Signed by Houston as an undrafted free agent in 2006, Charleston spent 2007 with Indianapolis. Picked up by the Saints in 2008, He's appeared in 47 games for New Orleans and recorded 66 tackles, six sacks, two forced fumbles, a recovery and 32 special teams stops.

Signed as undrafted free agent in 2010 out of Stillman College after starting his college career at Temple, Galette has evolved into a gifted pass rusher, currently ranked fourth on the team with 2.5 sacks.

A 2004 undrafted signing by Buffalo out of the University of Tennessee, Greer's become one of the NFL's elite defenders. Joining New Orleans in 2009, He covers the opposition's top wideouts. Greer's returned two interceptions for touchdowns as a Saint and recorded 42 pass defenses. In 2011, he's anchored a young Saints secondary posting 57 tackles (37 solo), one interception and a team-best 20 pass defenses.

Signed after the 2007 draft, Thomas has led the club in rushing in 2008 and 2009, scoring 27 touchdowns. Fully recovered from an ankle injury that hampered him in 2010, Thomas has 80 carries for 403 yards (5.0 avg.) with three touchdowns and also had added 35 receptions for 298 yards (8.5 avg.) with one touchdown for 701 total yards from scrimmage.

Signed as a free agent out of NCAA Division II Tiffin following the 2010 Draft, Ivory's played in 12 games as a rookie with four starts and was their leading rusher in all categories with 137 carries for 716 yards (5.2 avg.) with five TDs. After missing the first six games of 2011 due to foot and sports hernia injuries, Ivory's sprung back into action with 21 carries for 85 yards (4.0 avg.).

SCORING EXPLOSION

Since 2006, the Saints have scored an average of 27.6 points per game (2,511 points) in 91 contests, ranking third in the NFL during this time frame. During this period since Payton became head coach in 2006, New Orleans has scored 20 or more points in 73 games (80.2%) and 30 or more points in 41 contests (45.1%). The Saints have once again gotten off to a quick start in 2011 on the scoreboard, putting up at least 30 points in their first three games for the first time in team history, as well as a franchise-record 62 vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23 and 49 vs. the New York Giants on Sunday, the club's fifth-highest total. Three of the top five single-game point totals in franchise history have occurred since Payton took over in 2006. New Orleans is currently ranking second in the NFL averaging 32.9 points per game.

HOLDING THE LINE

The Saints offensive line remains one of the New Orleans offensive unit's foundations. Since 2006, New Orleans has been the second-least sacked club in the NFL, surrendering only 117 in 91 games. In 2011, the Saints have surrendered 19 sacks, tied for the fifth-fewest total in the NFL, having not surrendered a take-down in their last three games.

Ahead is a synopsis of the five starting members of the New Orleans Saints offensive line:

LT Jermon Bushrod - A 2007 fourth round draft pick, this promising young lineman has helped the Saints continue to run as one of the NFL's highest-ranked offenses after entering the starting lineup in 2009. The Towson product has continued adding strength and working on his technique as he continues to line up against many of the NFL's elite pass rushers entering his third season as a starter on one of the offensive line's most challenging positions.

LG Carl Nicks - This 6-5, 343 pound mauler who was a 2008 fifth-round draft choice out of the University of Nebraska, has needed very little time to make a smooth transition to life in interior of the NFL trenches. Selected for All-Rookie honors by several publications, Nicks has opened every contest since the fourth of his first year and combines with **Jahri Evans** for one of the NFL's top young interior offensive line combinations, as the two were both selected to the Pro Bowl in 2010, the first time in franchise history a guard tandem was selected to the league's all-star game.

C Brian de la Puente - De la Puente has assumed starting center duties, as the Saints offense has rolled up at least 400 yards in six of the contests that he has opened. After spending most of last season on the practice squad and time on five practice rosters since 2008, the former University of California standout secured the club's starting center spot.

RG Jahri Evans - The 2006 fourth round draft choice has made a rapid ascent from his small school roots at Bloomsburg into one of the NFL's top guards. Evans has been named to two consecutive Pro Bowls, elected as a starter. His 91 straight starts with the Saints is the longest streak in team history among offensive linemen to begin a career, tied for first overall among Saints, the most by a current Saint and also the third-longest current streak by an active NFL guard. Resigned to a seven-year contract in 2010, Evans is a cornerstone of the line for years to come.

T Zach Strief - This 2006 seventh round pick out of Northwestern has appeared in 77 games, starting six in 2011. Since his return to the starting lineup on November 6 following a knee injury that sidelined him five games, the Saints offensive line hasn't given up a sack. The versatile Strief has also served as an extra blocking tight end in short yardage situations.

WORTH NOTING ON DEFENSE

Shrewd roster moves in trades, free agency and the draft and the tutelage of coordinator **Gregg Williams** and his defensive staff have produced an opportunistic unit, resulting in a improvement to a defense that has moved up significantly in several league rankings since 2008, while showing a nose for the ball.

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

- Since arriving in New Orleans in 2006, Brees has been among the NFL's elite quarterbacks, throwing for 4,000 or more yards each season and ranking at or near the top in every passing category, breaking nearly every club record. His list of achievements culminated with leading his club to the Super Bowl XLIV title.

- In 2011, the five-time Pro Bowl selection has completed 323-of-460 throws (70.2%) for 3,689 yards with 27 TD passes, 11 interceptions and a 103.6 rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the NFL in attempts, completions, yardage, third down passer rating (120.6), second in completion percentage and third in passer rating and TD passes.

- Few players in the free agency era have made the impact on and off the field that Brees has on the Saints. Since arriving in 2006 after spending his first five years with San Diego, he leads the NFL with 26,607 yards, 182 TD passes, 3,473 attempts, 2,343 completions, a 67.5 % completion percentage, 45 games with at least 300 yards, six with at least 400 and 200 completions of 25 yards or more and ranks second with a 104.3 passer rating on third down, fourth at 96.9 overall.

- Leading the NFL with 3,689 yards passing, Brees has the most passing yardage in NFL record books by a player through the first 11 games of a season

- Brees' yardage total from 2007-10 was the most in a four-year period in NFL history and his total from 2006-10 is the most in a five-year period. He's the first quarterback in league record books to pass for at least 20,000 yards and 150 touchdowns in the first five seasons with a new team.

- Brees has been selected to play in four Pro Bowls as a Saint, five overall berths, twice as the NFC's starting signal-caller. Brees is the only Saints quarterback to be selected to the All-Star game more than twice. His four selections as a Saint are tied for fourth all-time in club record books.

- With a 57-33 regular season record in games he's started since signing with the Saints, Brees has the fourth-most wins by NFL quarterbacks since 2006, the most by a New Orleans signal caller all-time. Including his four victories in the postseason, he has recorded 61 total wins as a Saint. His 13-game winning streak in 2009 is the longest by a New Orleans signal-caller in team record books.

- Brees has engineered 18 regular season game-winning drives in the fourth quarter and overtime as a Saint, including three times in 2011. Brees also led two comebacks in the club's 2009 postseason, including in overtime of the NFC Championship game and the fourth quarter go-ahead scoring drive for a touchdown in Super Bowl XLIV.

- In his 11-year NFL career, Brees has completed 3,468-of-5,282 passes (65.7%) for 38,955 yards, 262 touchdown throws and a 92.8 passer rating. He's the league's third-most accurate passer of all-time, owns the NFL's ninth-best passer rating ever, is ranked tenth in completions, 11th in touchdown passes and 13th in passing yardage.

- Brees has thrown a touchdown pass in 38 consecutive regular season games, the second-longest streak in NFL history. Johnny Unitas holds the NFL record of 47.

- Brees was named the 2010 Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year, the 57th honoree of the award since the magazine's founding in 1954, which was based on both his on the field and off the field accomplishments. He also was only the fourth quarterback in the history of the award to be honored as the Associated Press Male Athlete of the Year.

Oct. 2, at Jacksonville: Brees completed 31 of 44 passes for 351 yards, one touchdown throw and two interceptions in helping lead the Saints to their third consecutive win.

Oct. 9, at Carolina: Brees completed 32 of 45 passes for 359 yards, two touchdowns, one interception and a 100.1 rating in leading the Saints to their fourth straight win. Trailing 27-23 in the fourth quarter, he led the Saints back from a four point deficit on a 11-play, 59-yard drive, where the Saints scored with 50 seconds left, as he completed seven-of-eight throws for 71 yards, including a six-yard touchdown pass to RB **Pierre Thomas**.

Oct. 16, at Tampa Bay: Brees completed 29 of 45 passes for 383 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions, as he became the first NFL quarterback to throw for at least 350 yards in four consecutive games.

Oct. 23, vs. Indianapolis: Brees completed 89 percent of his passes, the second-best single-game completion percentage in club history and the best by a QB with at least 20 attempts. Brees went 31 of 35 for 325 yards and five touchdowns and a 144.9 passer rating as he

was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for the first time in 2011.

Nov. 6, vs. Tampa Bay: Brees completed 27 of 36 passes for 258 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. He compiled a passer rating of 101.4. Brees moved up several other NFL all-time lists. He moved past **Dave Krieg** into 13th place for career passing yards (38,360) and moved past **Joe Montana** for 10th place in career completions (3,414).

Nov. 13, at Atlanta: Brees completed 30 of 43 passes for 322 yards, two touchdowns and a 106.9 passer rating in leading the Saints to an overtime win. After taking the ball in overtime at the Falcons 29-yard line, he moved the team down the field to set up **K John Kasay's** 26-yard game-winning field goal.

Nov. 28, vs. New York Giants: completed 24 of 38 passes for 363 yards, four touchdowns and no interceptions and a passer rating of 129.6. He also had an 8-yard touchdown run in the third quarter. Brees surpassed Krieg (261) to move into 11th place on the NFL's all-time list with his 262nd touchdown pass. Brees reached the 350-yard mark for the sixth time this season, tying an NFL mark for the most 350-yard games in a season. Brady had six 350-yard games in 2007. Brees threw a touchdown pass for the 38th consecutive game, the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Unitas' 47. He also extended his own NFL-record streak of games with 20 or more completions to 31. Brees upped his season touchdown pass total to 27, the sixth consecutive season and seventh overall in which he has thrown 25 or more. He became the first quarterback in Saints history with four passing TDs and one rushing TD in a game. He also became the first quarterback in the 42-year history of Monday Night Football with 350 or more passing yards, four passing TDs and a rushing TD in one game.

Clutch Quarterback

Since 2006, Brees has engineered 18 regular season drives in the fourth quarter or overtime for a touchdown or field goal to lead New Orleans to victory from a deficit or tie, three times in 2011, including the Nov. 13 26-23 overtime win at Atlanta. In the 2009 postseason, Brees engineered a game-winning overtime drive in the NFC Championship Game and a fourth-quarter go-ahead touchdown drive in Super Bowl XLIV.

Rating Success

With 42 games (min. 10 attempts) of a passer rating of at least 100 since 2006, Brees is tied with Brady for first in the NFL. The Saints have posted a 35-7 (.833) record in these games. In 2011, Brees has surpassed the century mark in seven contests.

• In 58 games with 19 starts over his five-year career, after originally joining the team as an undrafted free agent in 2007, Thomas has carried 491 times for 2,342 yards (4.8 avg.) with 21 touchdown runs and added 151 receptions for 1,236 yards (8.2 avg.) with seven scoring grabs. He's ranked third in club history in yards per carry, tied for seventh in rushing touchdowns, and ranked tenth in rushing yardage.

• In 2011, Thomas has carried 80 times for 403 yards (50 avg.) with three touchdowns, also catching 35 passes for 298 yards (8.5 avg.) with one touchdown for 701 total yards from scrimmage to rank third on the team overall.

2011 Memorable Moments

Oct. 9, at Carolina: Thomas' six-yard touchdown grab with 50 seconds remaining in the contest, helped bring the Saints back in their 30-27 win. A reception earlier in the drive, where rambled for an 18-yard gain also proved to be important.

Oct. 23, vs. Indianapolis: Thomas had 10 carries for 57 yards and five receptions for 68 yards in the blowout win, including a career-long 57-yard grab in the first quarter that helped set up New Orleans' second touchdown of the game.

Nov. 6, vs. Tampa Bay: Thomas had 91 total yards from scrimmage in the contest, as he finished with eight carries for 66 yards with a third quarter, nine-yard touchdown scamper and four receptions for 25 yards. Thomas' second quarter 33-yard run was his longest of the season.

Nov. 28, vs. New York Giants: Thomas led the team with 110 total yards from scrimmage in the Saints' third consecutive win to cap an undefeated month of November as he carried eight times for 63 yards (7.9) avg. with a fourth quarter 12-yard touchdown run and also recorded three receptions for 47 yards.

DARREN SPROLES

• Coming to New Orleans after six seasons with the San Diego Chargers, this 5-6, 190 pound all-purpose threat has been one of the NFL's most dynamic players running, receiving and on kickoff and punt returns, garnering a career total 11,708 all-purpose yards. Since 2007, no NFL player has matched his 10,010 all-purpose yards. In his career in 89 games, Sproles has carried 308 times for 1,556 yards (5.1 avg.) with eight touchdowns and recorded 208 receptions for 1,876 yards (9.0 avg.) with 14 touchdowns. Sproles has returned 284 kickoffs for 7,166 yards (25.2 avg.) with two touchdowns and returned 132 punts for 1,108 yards (8.4 avg.) with three scores. His five combined (kickoff and punt) five return touchdowns are fifth-most in the NFL since 2006.

• This all-purpose threat has provided an immediate injection into the Saints' running, passing and return game. Sproles has carried 59 times for a career-high 402 yards (6.8 avg.) with two touchdowns and is ranked fourth in the NFC and fifth in the NFL in receiving with a career-high 62 receptions for 476 yards (7.7 avg.), with three touchdowns, leading running backs in catches. He's also ranked fifth in the NFL with 480 yards after the catch. The former Kansas State standout has been particularly effective in working with Brees on third down situations, where he has made 22 receptions for 201 yards (9.1 avg.) and a scoring reception to rank first in the conference and tie for first in the league.

• On punt returns, Sproles has a 9.6 average, including a 72-yard touchdown in the opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8 and on kickoff returns he's ranked fourth in the conference and seventh in the league, averaging 26.8 yards per return. His 1,748 all-purpose yards currently leads the NFL. Sproles is the only NFL player in the NFL in 2011 to score on a rush, reception and punt return.

2011 Memorable Moments

Sept. 8, at Green Bay: Sproles made an immediate quick impression in his black and gold debut at the NFL's season opener as he garnered 250 all-purpose yards, the highest single-game total by a Saint since 2008 and the second-highest NFL week one total. Sproles carried two times for seven yards, had a team-best seven receptions for 75 yards, returned two punts for a career-high 92 yards, including a 72-yard runback for a touchdown and had two kickoff returns for 76 yards, including a 57-yarder.

Sept. 18, vs. Chicago: Sproles garnered 85 all-purpose yards, primarily fueled by a team-best eight receptions for 43 yards, including a 12-yard reception where he rolled along the sideline for a fourth quarter touchdown to give the Saints a 30-13 lead. Sproles also carried four times for 17 yards.

Sept. 25, vs. Houston: Sproles gained 193 all-purpose yards, including a spectacular 30-yard run between the tackles in the second quarter for a touchdown.

Oct. 2, at Jacksonville: Sproles gained 188 all-purpose yards in New Orleans' first road victory of the 2011 season. He carried seven times for 75 yards (10.7 avg.) for the team's highest individual rushing total to date and tied for second on the team in receiving with five grabs for 56 yards (11.2 avg.).

2011 Memorable Moments

Oct. 9, at Carolina: Sproles gained 91 total yards from scrimmage and was his team's leading rusher with 11 carries for 51 yards. On his team's second drive of the day, Sproles' 23-yard rush helped set up a field goal. Sproles also helped put the Saints into range to kick a field goal for the final play of the first half, when facing a third-and-20 situation from the Carolina 40, he got back 12 yards on a pass from Brees.

Oct. 23, vs. Indianapolis: Sproles had 190 all-purpose yards, increasing his season total to 1,115. He had 12 carries for 88 yards and a fourth quarter 16-yard touchdown, six receptions for 19 yards and a second quarter six-yard score, and added 83 yards in returns.

Nov. 6, vs. Tampa Bay: Sproles made a significant contribution on every facet of offense and special teams. He had four carries for 42 yards, including a first quarter 35-yard blast that put the Saints in Tampa Bay territory to help set up their first touchdown, added five receptions for 57 yards, including a second-quarter 21-yard pass play for a touchdown, returned a punt for 15 yards and added two kickoff returns for 54 yards.

MARK INGRAM

• A hard-nosed runner who punishes opposing defenses with a formidable combination of power and speed, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner played in 39 games at Alabama – with only 24 starts – but rushed for 3,261 yards and ran for 42 touchdowns, scoring 46 times overall. A unanimous first-team All-American, Ingram shattered school records in 2009 with 1,658 yards rushing on 271 carries with 17 touchdowns for the Crimson Tide's BCS National Championship squad, as he became the first player in their storied history to capture the Heisman. Chosen with a first round pick acquired by the Saints from New England in a draft day trade, Ingram is the ninth running back picked by the Saints in the first round and the fourth Heisman Trophy winner among the group.

• Ingram is New Orleans' leading rusher as a rookie in a three-back rotation, despite missing two games with a heel injury with 106 carries for 420 yards (4.0 avg.) with four touchdowns. Particularly effective in short yardage, Ingram has converted nine-of-11 third-and-one rushing attempts (81.8%) to rank seventh in the NFC. He's also added 11 receptions for 46 yards.

• Ingram scored his first career-touchdown on a fourth quarter 13-yard game-winning run, as he totaled nine rushes for 38 yards in a backfield with split carries with Thomas and Sproles vs. Houston, Sept. 25.

• Ingram powered the rushing attack that racked up 236 yards vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23, carrying 14 times for a game-high 91 yards (6.5 avg.) before leaving the game in the fourth quarter with a bruised heel injury.

• Splitting carries with Sproles and Thomas to spearhead a running attack that gained 205 yards, Ingram was New Orleans' leading rusher vs. the New York Giants, Nov. 28, on an evening where he carried 13 times for 80 yards (6.2 avg., with a fourth quarter career-long 35-yard scoring run. He also added two receptions for 14 yards

CHRIS IVORY

• A rugged, between-the-tackles runner, this undrafted rookie free agent from Tiffin (Ohio) earned a roster spot following a 2010 training camp where he turned eyes both running the ball as well as in the passing game. As a rookie he led the Saints in rushing in 2010, carrying 137 times for 716 yards (5.2 avg.) with five touchdowns. Ivory was ranked fifth in the NFL in yards per carry and second among league rookies in rushing yardage.

• After spending the first six games of the 2011 season on the club's physically unable to perform list following offseason foot and sports hernia surgeries, Ivory has returned to action after starting the season on the physically unable to perform list, receiving the starting nod vs. Tampa Bay, Nov. 6, where he led the team in rushing with 15 carries for 67 yards (4.5 avg.).

FB JED COLLINS

• After originally being signed by Philadelphia in 2008 as an undrafted free agent and spending time on the practice squads of five times, including New Orleans, this converted college linebacker captured the starting full-back role in a training camp competition in training camp through his work ethic, persistence and physical nature. Collins' blocking has played a key role in a rushing unit that has improved its league ranking from 28th in 2010 to 13th in 2011. With only nine offensive touches in 2011, Collins has scored three touchdowns, carrying three times for two yards with two scores and making six catches for 31 yards with one touchdown.

• Collins scored a touchdown on a one-yard run at Jacksonville, Oct. 2 on his first career offensive touch, also helping power a New Orleans running attack that gained a season-best 177 yards on the ground.

• On his third career NFL touch at Carolina, Oct. 9, he scored on a one-yard touchdown reception.

- Collins' one-yard touchdown run vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23, gave New Orleans a 28-0 lead, as he blocked for a rushing attack that ran for 236 yards, the highest total by the Saints since 2006.

- Collins' 12-yard reception in overtime at Atlanta, Nov. 13, put New Orleans in position for K **John Kasay's** 26-yard field goal.

WIDE RECEIVERS

MARQUES COLSTON

- Since being chosen as the 252nd overall choice in the seventh round of the 2006 NFL Draft, Colston has become one of the league's top targets. Colston has recorded 414 catches for 5,764 yards (13.9 avg.) and 43 receiving touchdowns to put him among the club's all-time leaders in every receiving category. The former Hofstra standout's currently ranked third in franchise record books in receptions, receiving yardage and receiving touchdowns and tied for second in 100-yard receiving games (18).

- After missing two games with a shoulder injury, Colston has rounded into form with 45 receptions for 667 yards (14.8 avg.) with three touchdowns to lead Saints wideouts in receiving.

- After going over 1,000 yards receiving in 2010, Colston's only one of seven who have reached 1,000 in at least four of the past five seasons joining **Reggie Wayne** (5), **Andre Johnson** (4), **Roddy White** (4), **Donald Driver** (4), **Brandon Marshall** (4) and **Larry Fitzgerald** (4).

- Colston also joined **Lance Alworth**, **Torry Holt**, **Randy Moss**, **Chad Ochocinco** and **Jerry Rice** as only the sixth NFL player to have recorded 1,000 receiving yards in four of his first five seasons.

- With 18 100-yard receiving games, only one Saint has surpassed the mark on more occasions than Colston. He's recorded at least one touchdown catch in 33 of 81 games, nine with multiple scoring grabs.

- Of his 414 career receptions, 292 have moved the chains for a first down. Over that time span, Colston has 107 catches for 1,537 yards (14.4 avg.) and 14 touchdowns on third down.

- Colston's recorded a total of 81 receptions of 20 yards or more, including 13 touchdown grabs of 20 yards or more.

2011 Memorable Moments

Oct. 16, at Tampa Bay: Colston reached the century mark for the first time in 2011 when he led the team in receiving yardage with seven receptions for 124 yards. Colston's 38-yard touchdown receptions from Brees in the first quarter put New Orleans on the scoreboard.

Oct. 23, vs. Indianapolis: Colston had a pair of first-quarter TD receptions. It was the ninth multiple touchdown game of Colston's career and his first since a Dec. 12, 2010 win against St. Louis. Colston led the Saints in receiving with seven grabs for 98 yards.

Nov. 13, at Atlanta: Colston led the Saints in receiving with a season-high eight catches for 113 yards (14.1 avg.). All eight of his receptions went for first downs and four of the catches were on third down. It was the 18th 100-yard performance of Colston's career, tying him with **Eric Martin** (1985-93) for second in franchise record books.

Nov. 28, vs. New York Giants: For the second consecutive week each catch Colston had went for a first down, as he had three grabs for 78 yards (26.0) avg. All of his receptions occurred on a second quarter scoring drive, including a 50-yard grab to put the Saints in Giants territory.

48 – Catches of 25 yards or more, including 86 and 70-yard TDs. He has 80 catches of 20 or more.

455 – Receiving yardage in a three-game stretch in 2006 (10/29-11/12), the most yardage over such a span in club record books. He had over 100 yards in all three contests, a streak that he equaled again in 2007.

9 – Colston has had over 90 yards in nine contests. It's also the number of career multiple-touchdown games.

5 – Consecutive games with a TD reception that Colston posted from Dec. 11, 2008 through Sept. 27, 2009. Colston shares the record with Lance Moore who first extended the mark in 2008.

DEVERY HENDERSON

• One of the NFL's top deep threats, the speedy wide-out is another dangerous component to the New Orleans offense with his ability to stretch opposing defenses, averaging 18.8 yards per reception since 2006, second-best in the NFL. He has 17 catches of over 50 yards in his career. His five catches of 75 yards or more since 2006 is tied for second in the NFL. Henderson's 24.8 yards per catch average in 2008 was ranked first in the NFL by nearly five yards, the fourth-best figure since 1950. He has two of the top six receiving average single-season figures since 1950.

• Henderson's has 23 receptions for 385 yards (16.7 avg.) in 2011, reaching the century mark in two contests with two touchdowns.

• Henderson made big plays in the passing game in the opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8, when he finished with six receptions for 100 yards with a 29-yard TD. It was the first time he reached the century mark since 2009.

• Vs. Chicago, Sept. 18, Henderson made three receptions for a team-best 103 yards (34.3 avg.) with a 79-yard second quarter scoring reception as he reached the century mark in yardage for the second consecutive week and for the ninth time in his career, tying him for fifth in club record books.

- Henderson's second quarter 44-yard catch vs. Houston, Sept. 25 put the Saints in position for a field goal that would put them within six points at halftime.

- In his eight-year career, Henderson, a second-round draft choice of the club in 2004, has averaged 18.4 yards per reception, the highest receiving average of a Saint with at least 100 grabs and the highest of any NFL players during this period. Of his 192 grabs since 2006, 40 have been completions of 25 yards or more, the second-most on the team during this period.

- Henderson's enjoyed nine 100-yard days, tied for fifth in club records, 3,943 receiving yards, which ranks fifth, 19 touchdown catches, rank 11th and has rushed for one touchdown. He owns three of the five-top single-season yards per catch figures in club history.

LANCE MOORE

- This former undrafted free agent and member of the Saints practice squad from Toledo has emerged from his humble beginnings and developed into one of Brees' most reliable targets, tying for fifth in club record books with 27 touchdown catches.

- After missing the season opener with a groin injury and seeing limited action the following week, Moore is once again one of the club's leading pass-catchers, ranking second on the New Orleans wideout corps in 2011 with 39 receptions for 440 yards (11.3 avg.) and five touchdown grabs.

- Moore has started to heat up as he had a career-high nine receptions, including a 16-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter vs. Houston, Sept. 25, with four catches on the drive where he scored, not including his successful two-point conversion.

- Moore's three-yard touchdown grab on a perfect fade route from Brees gave New Orleans a 7-0 lead vs. Tampa Bay, Nov. 6.

- Moore had his first two-touchdown game of the season and fifth of his career, when he had five grabs for 54 yards (10.8 avg.) vs. New York Giants, Nov. 28, as he moved into a tie for fifth place on the club's all-time list for touchdown grabs with TE **Henry Childs** (27).

ROBERT MEACHEM

- This 2007 first round draft choice recorded 44 catches for 638 yards with five touchdown grabs, averaging a club-best 14.5 yards per reception in 2010.

- Big plays in the passing game have been a specialty throughout his NFL career for Meachem as he's averaged 15.4 yards per catch to rank fifth in club record books in receiving average. 21 of his 129 grabs have occurred in the end zone to tie for ninth in team history for scoring catches.

- In 2011, Meachem has recorded 29 receptions for 359 yards (12.4 avg.) with four scoring grabs to rank third on the team in touchdown receptions.

- Meachem's third quarter two-yard touchdown reception vs. Houston, Sept. 25, gave New Orleans a 17-16 edge and their first lead of a contest that would feature six lead changes. His day ended with five receptions for 51 yards.

- Although Meachem had only two receptions at Atlanta, Nov. 13, they were both turned into big plays in the passing game, going for 36 yards and also a third quarter 33-yard scoring catch.

TIGHT ENDS

JIMMY GRAHAM

- The Black and Gold's third round draft choice in 2010, Graham has made a successful transition from the basketball hardwood at power forward, which he played at the University of Miami (Fla.) for four years, to the football field at the tight end position. Following his only fall of college football in 2009, Graham's become one of the club's most prominent big play targets for Brees, enjoying the most prolific season by a Saints tight end in franchise history. He's currently ranked first on the Saints in catches, receiving yardage and touchdown grabs with 67 receptions for 957 yards (14.3 avg) and eight touchdowns.

- The leader in catches and receiving yardage among NFL tight ends, overall, Graham is currently ranked first in the NFC and second in the NFL in receptions, tied for third in the conference and fourth in the league in yardage, tied for sixth in the conference and tenth in the league in scoring among nonkickers, ranked 11th in the NFC and 19th in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage and fourth in the conference and tied for eighth in the league in first downs (51).

- Graham had four receptions for 56 yards in the opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8, including a fourth quarter five-yard TD grab that put the Saints within eight.

- Graham set career-highs for catches and yardage in the home opening win vs. Chicago, Sept. 18, when he finished with six receptions for 79 yards (13.2 avg.).

- Graham further extended his career-high for receiving yardage when he had four grabs for a team-best 100 yards and one touchdown vs. Houston, Sept. 25. Graham's fourth quarter 27-yard scoring grab helped ignite a 23-point fourth quarter for New Orleans.

- Graham set new career-highs in catches, yardage and a receiving long at Jacksonville, Oct. 2, when he grabbed ten balls from Brees for 132 yards, including a 59-yard grab, with one touchdown.

- Graham became the first Saints tight end and only the third player in franchise history to have three straight 100-yard games, when he led New Orleans in receiving and yardage with eight grabs for 129 yards at Carolina, Oct. 9.

- Graham became the first Saint and only the second NFL tight end since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to have

four straight games of 100 yards receiving when he had seven grabs for a game-high 124 yards at Tampa Bay, Oct. 16.

- Graham caught two TD passes as part of his six receptions for 54 yards vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23. Though his streak of 100-yard receiving games was snapped at four, Graham had his second career multi-TD game (also at Baltimore on Dec. 19, 2010).

- Graham overcame a pair of early drops to finish with seven receptions for 82 yards, including a second quarter 21-yard scoring grab at Atlanta, Nov. 13. In the game, Graham set a single-season franchise record for receptions by a Saints tight end.

- Graham had the third two-touchdown performance of the season and of his career as he tied for the team lead with eight catches for 84 yards with two TDs vs. New York Giants, Nov. 28. The touchdowns were his seventh and eighth on the season, moving him into second place on the single-season list among Saints tight ends. Only Henry Childs (nine, 1977) has more.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

WILL SMITH

- One of the club's two defensive team captains, Smith has recorded 525 tackles (316 solo), 60.5 sacks to rank fourth in club record books, two interceptions, 23 pass defenses, 19 forced fumbles, six fumble recoveries and one Pro Bowl selection (2006) in 118 games with 99 starts since being drafted 18th overall in 2004.

- In nine games in 2011, Smith has made an immediate impact on the New Orleans pass rush, ranking second on the team with 5.5 sacks and adding two forced fumble, ranking among leaders on the club's defensive line with 36 tackles (20 solo).

- Smith led the New Orleans defensive line with five solo tackles, two sacks and two pass defenses in an aggressive, standout effort at St. Louis, Oct. 30.
- Along with DT **Shaun Rogers**, Smith was credited for helping seal up a key fourth-and-one run play by Atlanta RB **Michael Turner** in overtime at their 29-yard line, allowing S **Malcolm Jenkins** to make the tackle for no gain that gave the Saints the ball back at the Falcons, Nov. 13.
- With his third-quarter sack of QB **Eli Manning** vs. New York Giants, Nov. 28, Smith became the fourth player in franchise history to record 60 or more sacks.

TURK McBRIDE

- Turk McBride came to New Orleans in training camp, after enjoying the most productive two seasons of his career with the Detroit Lions. Originally a second round draft pick of Kansas City in 2007, McBride's played in 58 games with 24 starts and has career totals of 119 tackles (70 solo), 9.5 sacks, one pass defense, six forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and five special teams stops.

- After spending the last two seasons in Detroit, McBride was signed by New Orleans in training camp as an unrestricted free agent has started two games from at left defensive end in 2011, recording nine tackles (three solo), two sacks and a forced fumble.
- McBride had an impressive Saints debut in the Superdome vs. Chicago, Sept. 18, when his third quarter sack of Bears QB **Jay Cutler** forced a fumble that was recovered and would put the Saints in position to score a touchdown that would help extend their lead to 23-13.
- McBride posted five tackles (two solo) and a sack of Texans QB **Matt Schaub** vs. Houston, Sept. 25.

JEFF CHARLESTON

- Charleston, a fifth-year defensive end has been a key member of the line rotation since coming as a free agent midway through the 2008 season. This maximum effort player has appeared in 61 games, with four starts and has recorded 109 tackles (57 solo), seven sacks, four passes defended, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery, also adding 32 special teams tackles.

JUNIOR GALETTE

- Galette's a speed-rushing defensive end who's also excelled on the special teams coverage units. One of two undrafted free agents to make the Saints opening day roster in 2010. In 2011, Galette has seen extensive action in the club's defensive line rotation, adding 14 tackles (eight solo), one pass defense and 2.5 sacks.
- In his most extensive action to date, Galette had three tackles (one solo) and split a sack of QB **Aaron Rodgers** with S **Roman Harper** to record his first career takedown in the opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8.
- Galette tied for the team lead with Harper in recording two takedowns of Cutler vs. Chicago, Sept. 18.

DE CAMERON JORDAN

- New Orleans' first pick in the 2011 draft (24th overall) out of California was a four-year letterman, who played both left and right end in a 3-4 and appeared in 50 games with 33 starts. He ended his college career with 175 tackles (88 solo), 16.5 sacks, 34 tackles for a loss of 122 yards, four forced fumbles, four recoveries, one interception and five pass defenses. Possessing a non-stop motor, he was stout against the run and emerged as one of the elite pass rushers in college. As a senior in 2010, the team captain started all 12 games at left end and recorded 62 tackles (33 solo), 5.5 sacks, 12.5 stops for a loss, three forced fumbles, one recovered for a TD and four pass defenses.

- Jordan has started all 11 games, nine at the left end spot as a rookie and leads the defensive line in stops with 48 tackles (20 solo), three pass defenses and one fumble recovery.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

SEDRICK ELLIS

- The seventh choice in the 2008 NFL draft out of the University of Southern California, Ellis led the Saints in 2010 with a career-high six sacks, tied for fourth in the league among defensive tackles, and also recorded a career-best 78 tackles (30 solo), to rank first on the line, one forced fumble and three pass defenses.

- Ellis has opened all 50 games he's played in his career. His combination of skills to both defend against the run and ability to rush the passer effectively have been an asset to the New Orleans line rotation. He's posted 203 tackles (86 solo), 12.5 sacks, 14 passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

- Ellis tied a career-high with ten tackles (three solo) as part of an interior effort that held the Texans to only 28 second-half rushing yards vs. Houston, Sept. 25.

- Ellis and Smith combined to sack Carolina QB **Cam Newton** for a five-yard loss on a third down play in the second quarter, forcing them to punt at the Panthers, Oct. 9.

AUBRAYO FRANKLIN

- Franklin comes to New Orleans after playing an instrumental role as a starter on the San Francisco 49ers defensive line from 2007-10. A stalwart against the run, Franklin played a big role in the 49ers holding opponents to 3.7 yards per carry from 2007-10, ranked fourth in the NFL in this period. Originally a fifth round draft choice of the Baltimore Ravens in 2003, Franklin's appeared in 109 games with 67 starts, having played in 64 consecutive games, the fourth-longest current streak among NFL defensive tackles. The durable defender has recorded 400 tackles (208 solo), four sacks, one interception, eight pass defenses, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

SHAUN ROGERS

- Rogers has started 128 of 151 career games played, recording 594 tackles (400 solo), 38 sacks, one interception, 24 pass defenses, four forced fumbles and eight recoveries. The three-time Pro Bowl selection, who spent the last three seasons with Cleveland has helped the interior in stopping the run. The former University of Texas standout has taken advantage of his powerful build to block 14 field goal attempts.

- Rogers' build has been an asset in the middle of the Saints defensive line, where he's contributed 21 tackles (12 solo) in 11 games with four starts.

- Along with DE **Will Smith**, Rogers was credited for helping seal up a key fourth-and-one run play by Atlanta RB Michael Turner in overtime at their 29-yard line, allowing S **Malcolm Jenkins** to make the tackle for no gain that gave the Saints the ball back at the Falcons, Nov. 13.

TOM JOHNSON

- After playing in both the Arena Football League and Canadian Football League, this Mississippi Gulf Coast native has found his niche along the New Orleans defensive line. Fully recovered from a calf injury suffered in training camp, Johnson has played on the defensive line rotation for the last six games and has recorded 16 tackles (eight solo) and one forced fumble.

LINEBACKERS

SCOTT SHANLE

- Shanle's been a vastly underrated and vital part of the defense since arriving in 2006. He's a three-down linebacker who can blitz, cover running backs and tight ends and fill holes in the running attack. Making 622 tackles since 2006, Shanle has more stops than any other Saints defender during this period.

- In 2011, Shanle's once again among the team leaders in tackles having seen action at both the weakside and strongside positions with 60 stops (33 solo), one interception and four pass defenses, adding two special teams tackles.

- On the first play of the fourth quarter, Shanle's 13-yard interception return of a **Matt Ryan** pass helped snuff out an Atlanta drive at the Falcons, Nov. 13. He also added nine tackles (seven solo) and one pass defense as he moved over to the strongside position due to a knee injury that forced **Jonathan Vilma** to miss the game.

JONATHAN VILMA

- Vilma's brought a combination of youth and experience to the middle of the defense. The University of Miami (Fla.) product is one of the NFL's top middle linebackers and has earned three Pro Bowl selections in his career, two coming as a Saint the last two seasons.

- Through eight seasons, he's recorded 913 tackles (607 solo), 11 interceptions, 9.5 sacks, 11 forced fumbles, ten fumble recoveries and 37 pass defenses, starting 107 of the 109 games he's played in.

- In 2011, Vilma's once again ranked among club leaders with 41 stops (24 solo), three pass defenses, one forced fumble and a team-best and career-high three defensive fumble recoveries to tie for first in the NFL, one recovered in the end zone for a touchdown.
- On the first possession of the game vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23, Vilma gave New Orleans momentum as he recovered a mishandled snap exchange, setting up a touchdown drive for the Saints offense.
- Trailing 24-0 in the third quarter at St. Louis, Oct. 30, Vilma recovered a fumble forced by S **Malcolm Jenkins** in the endzone for a touchdown. It was the second defensive TD of his NFL career, the other occurring as a rookie against the Rams.

JO-LONN DUNBAR

- Since joining the club as an undrafted free agent in 2008, Dunbar's been an asset on defense and special teams, possessing the ability to play all three positions. Appearing in 48 career games with 23 starts, he's made 142 tackles (80 solo), one sack, seven pass defenses, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and 35 special teams stops.
- Dunbar has appeared in all 11 games, with ten starts in 2011 at strongside and in the middle and leads Saints linebackers with 69 tackles (42 solo), two pass defenses, a team-leading three forced fumbles and three special teams stops.
- Dunbar started in place of an injured Vilma at his natural middle linebacker position vs. Houston, Sept. 25 and led the team with 12 tackles (eight solo) and two pass defenses.
- Dunbar started in place of an injured Vilma in the middle at Atlanta, Nov. 13 and recorded nine tackles (six solo) and a forced fumble. His most important stop and the forced fumble took place in overtime, where in a play that was ruled after a replay, where he stopped Atlanta FB **Mike Cox** for no gain and forced the ball out of his hands and out of bounds on a third-and-one play at the Atlanta 29-yard line.
- Dunbar started on the inside for the third consecutive week and tied for the team lead with ten tackles (five solo), forced a fumble by Giants RB **Brandon Jacobs** on a rush for a gain of only two yards and added a special teams stop vs. New York, Nov. 28.

JONATHAN CASILLAS

- After starting two games in place of an injured Shanle as an undrafted rookie in 2009, collecting 20 defensive tackles and five special teams stops, Casillas was primed for a starting role in 2010 before he suffered a season-ending foot injury in the preseason finale which required surgery.
- Fully recovered from the surgery and rehabilitation in 2011, Casillas has seen extensive action in all 11 contests with three starts on the outside and has recorded a career-high 48 tackles (29 solo), three sacks to rank third on the Saints and three pass defenses, while still ranking among team leaders on the club's punt and kickoff coverage units with six special teams stops.
- Casillas' thid down sack of Indianapolis QB **Curtis Painter** vs. the Colts, Oct. 23, forced a punt, which gave the Saints the ball back for a drive that produced a touchdown and a 28-0 lead.
- Casillas started on the outside vs. Tampa Bay, Nov. 6 and tied a career-high with ten tackles (six solo), critical in a run-stopping effort that held the Buccaneers to 84 yards on the ground.
- Casillas started at weakside at Atlanta, Nov. 13 and tied a career-high in stops with 11 tackles (five solo) and a pass defense.

WILL HERRING

- A member of the club's outside linebacker rotation, Herring has recorded 78 tackles (61 solo), one sack, two interception, four passes defended, and 2 forced fumbles in his five-year NFL career with 37 special teams tackles. He spent his first four seasons in Seattle before joining the Saints as an unrestricted free agent. Herring has started nine games and appeared in 57 contests since being drafted by the Seattle Seahawks in the fifth round of the 2007 NFL draft. In 2010, he appeared in 15 games and finished with 26 tackles (22 solo), one sack, one interception, two passes defended and one forced fumble. A standout on the coverage units, Herring also finished the season with ten special teams tackles.
- After struggling with a hamstring injury at the beginning of the season, Herring saw his most extensive action on defense and special teams to date vs. New York Giants, Nov. 28 and intercepted an **Eli Manning** pass in the end zone in the first quarter, added a pass defense and recorded a special teams tackle in the Monday night victory.

CORNERBACKS

JABARI GREER

• Greer was a significant offseason addition in 2009 as an free agent signing from Buffalo that has bolstered the Saints secondary. Greer has evolved from the role of undrafted special teams demon to covering the NFL's top wideouts. One of the NFL's fastest players, Greer has returned two interceptions for touchdown as a Saint, four overall in his eight-year NFL career which began as an undrafted free agent.

• In 2011, Greer leads the saints in pass breakups, recording 57 tackles (41 solo), one interception, a career-high 20 pass defenses and one forced fumble.

• Greer's fourth quarter interception of Texans QB **Matt Schaub** vs. Houston, Sept. 25, helped set up a touchdown in the club's come-from-behind win. He also added three solo tackles and two pass defenses in the victory.

• Greer had a career-best four pass defenses along with six tackles (five solo) in a standout effort at Jacksonville, Oct. 2.

• Greer registered ten tackles (four solo) and defended four passes at Atlanta, Nov. 13.

• Greer recorded five tackles (four solo) and added two pass defenses vs. New York Giants, Nov. 28.

TRACY PORTER

• The fleet-footed Porter, the club's 2008 second-round draft choice out of Indiana University has been a starter since day one in the New Orleans secondary. In 2010, the Port Allen native finished among leaders in the Saints defensive backfield with 63 tackles (48 solo) to go with one interception, one fumble recovery and eight pass defenses despite undergoing knee surgery that caused him to miss four games before returning in week nine.

• Porter has appeared in nine games with seven starts in 2011 after recovering from offseason knee surgery and has 39 tackles (33 solo), five pass defenses and two forced fumbles.

• The steady defender tied a career-high with ten tackles (eight solo), forced a fumble that was recovered by teammate **Roman Harper** and also added a pass defense.

PATRICK ROBINSON

• The 2010 first round draft pick out of Florida State possesses the speed needed to keep up with the NFL's fastest wideouts and outstanding ball skills. Robinson appeared in 11 games and made four starts in his 2010 rookie campaign, recording 25 tackles (20 solo), three pass defenses and four special teams stops.

• Robinson has started five of the nine games he has played and has posted a career-high 40 tackles (30 solo), a team-best two interceptions and seven pass defenses, playing effectively against the NFL's top wide receivers.

• Robinson recorded the first interception of his NFL career at Jacksonville, Oct. 2, in a pick that set up a field goal to give the Saints a ten-point lead. Robinson also stopped Jacksonville RB **Deji Karim** for a two-yard loss on the same third quarter series.

• Robinson had an interception in his second consecutive game, a 25-yard return on the first play from scrimmage of rookie QB **Cam Newton** at Carolina, Oct. 9, which put New Orleans at the Panthers six-yard line and set up their first touchdown.

LEIGH TORRENCE

• Acquired by the Saints off the waiver wire in 2008, Torrence has been an integral part of the club's special teams units. In his five-year NFL career, He's recorded 94 tackles (68 solo), 3.5 sacks, one interception, ten pass defenses and 61 special teams stops.

• In 2011, Torrence has seen extensive action in nickel and dime packages and has contributed 17 tackles (12 solo), one sack, one interception return for a touchdown and three pass defenses, while leading the punt and kickoff coverage units on special teams with eighth tackles..

• Torrence posted three tackles (two solo), two pass defenses and one special teams stop vs. Houston, Sept. 25. His third down sack of QB **Matt Schaub** on the Texans' final drive put them in a fourth-and-21 situation.

• Torrence had a fourth quarter 42-yard interception return for a touchdown of Colts QB **Curtis Painter** vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23, the first score of his NFL career.

SAFETIES

ROMAN HARPER

• For the past six seasons, this hard hitter has been one of the Saints' most consistent and dependable performers. The team's second round draft choice in 2006 and the longest-tenured member of the secondary, has started all 78 games he's been active for at strong safety and has recorded 544 stops (387 solo), 16 sacks, four interceptions, 39 pass defenses, 12 forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. He's the only Saints safety to have been selected to two Pro Bowls.

• In 2011, Harper's again filled up the stat sheet as the hard-hitter leads the team in stops and sacks with 83 tackles (59 solo) and 6.5 sacks, ranked 12th in the NFC and tied for 20th in the NFL and first among defensive backs, adding five pass defenses and one forced fumble. Harper's captured NFC Defensive Player of the Week twice in 2011. His single-season sack total is the highest by a Saints defensive back in franchise history and tied for third overall in NFL record books.

• Harper filled up the stat sheet and led an aggressive New Orleans defensive attack in the home-opening win vs. Chicago, Sept. 18, when he recorded six tackles (four solo), sacked QB **Jay Cutler** twice to tie a career-high and added one pass defense. Harper captured NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his NFL career.

• An aggressive attack against a rookie quarterback in **Blaine Gabbert** at Jacksonville, Oct. 2, was led by Harper who led the Saints with ten tackles (six solo) and one sack.

• Harper tied for the team lead with ten tackles (seven solo), one forced fumble on a successful first quarter fourth-and-one stop of RB **LeGarrette Blount** and one second quarter sack of Buccaneers QB **Josh Freeman** vs. Tampa Bay, Nov. 6.

• Harper captured NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the second time this season based on his performance at Atlanta, Nov. 13, where he set a career-high with 16 tackles (11 solo), in addition to a sack of Falcons QB **Matt Ryan** for a loss of eight yards and a pass defense.

• Harper finished with four tackles (three solo) and recovered a third quarter fumble at the Giants 29-yard line, which would set up a touchdown vs. New York,

MALCOLM JENKINS

• A consensus All-American at Ohio State and the top-rated defensive back in the 2009 NFL Draft, where he was picked 14th overall, Jenkins converted to free safety in 2010, ranking second in the secondary with 82 tackles (56 solo), two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, one sack, a team-leading 11 pass defenses, one forced fumble and two fumble. Jenkins was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week twice, the most by a Saints defender since 2001 and was named *Associated Press* second-team All-Pro in his first season at a new position. The NFL weekly honors came twice in three weeks.

- In 2011, Jenkins is ranked second on the club in stops with 78 tackles (48 solo), one sack, one forced fumble and seven passes defended.

- Jenkins' third quarter sack of Rams QB **A.J. Feeley** at their one-yard line dislodged the ball from the signal-caller and it was picked up in the end zone by Vilma to give New Orleans their first points in the contest at St. Louis, Oct. 30. Jenkins also added five solo tackles.

- Jenkins made 11 tackles (seven solo) at Atlanta, Nov. 13, but his most important stop came in overtime on a fourth-and-one play at Atlanta's 29-yard line, where he stuffed Falcons RB **Michael Turner** for no gain.

JONATHON AMAYA

- Amaya joined the Saints entering his second NFL season after he was acquired via a trade from Miami at the start of camp. Amaya was added to the team's active roster from the practice squad at midseason and led the Dolphins with 15 tackles and one fumble recovery in 10 games. Amaya will contribute in nickel and dime packages as well as on special teams where he's made seven stops to tie for first on the Saints.

SPECIAL TEAMS

SPECIALISTS

- K **John Kasay** acquired in training camp, is one of the best kickers in NFL history and the NFL's longest tenured player entering his 21st season. He comes to New Orleans after spending the last 16 seasons with Carolina, where he ranks as the club's all-time leader in most scoring categories and games played (222). Originally breaking into the NFL as a fourth-round draft pick of Seattle in 1991, Kasay ranks eighth in NFL history for points scored with 1,929, while his 455 field goals rank sixth. He ranks second in points and field goals made among active kickers. Kasay's made at least one field goal of at least 50 yards in 18 of his 21 seasons, 42 overall to rank second in NFL record books. Overall Kasay has appeared in 296 career games, tenth in NFL record books. He's hit 14 game-winning field goals.

- Signed after Garrett Hartley suffered a season-ending hip injury, Kasay is ranked third in the NFL in scoring among kickers with 106 points, as he's drilled 22-of-27 field goal attempts, including a 52- and 53-yarders.

- Kasay enjoyed a perfect start to his Saints career in the season opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8, when he drilled both field goal attempts and four extra points.

- Kasay kicked three field goals on three attempts vs. Chicago, Sept. 18, giving him 438 for his career and

moving him past **Jason Elam** for sixth place in NFL history. His 53-yard field goal in the second quarter was the 41st field goal of 50 or more yards in his career, breaking a tie with former New Orleans kicker **Morten Andersen** for second place all-time in NFL history. Hanson (46) holds the NFL record for most field goals of 50 or more yards.

- In a return to the city where he spent the majority of his NFL career, Kasay produced a total of 12 points, drilling field goals from 23, 46 and 37-yards in a winning effort at Carolina, Oct. 9.

- Kasay set a career-high and had a franchise record with eight successful PATs, while also drilling 23- and 47-yard field goal attempts vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 23.

- Kasay drilled a 26-yard field goal through the uprights in overtime, as part of a day when he hit four-of-five field goal attempts and also two PATs at Atlanta, Nov. 13.

- **P Thomas Morstead**, the club's fifth round draft pick in 2009, was among the nation's top punters at Southern Methodist University. In 2011, he's near or at the top of most statistical categories, ranked third in the NFC and seventh in the NFL with a 47.8 gross punting average and second in the league with a 42.5 net average on 33 punts, including ten pinned inside the 20. Also handling kickoffs, 46 of his kicks have sailed into the end zone for touchbacks to rank first in the NFL.

- Morstead averaged 40.4 yards on five punts, tying a career-long of 64 yards and placed three punts inside the 20-yard line and kicking six-of-seven kickoffs into the end zone for five touchbacks at Atlanta, Nov. 13, effectively neutralizing the Falcons' return game.

PUNT/KICKOFF COVERAGE UNITS

- Players expected to play key roles on coverage units include Abdul-Quddus, Amaya, Cassillas, Charleston, Collins, Dunbar, DE **Junior Galette**, FB **Korey Hall**, Herring, Harper, LB **Ramon Humber**, Jenkins, Robinson, WR **Courtney Roby**, Shanle, Torrence and LB **Martez Wilson**. These changes have been shown on the punt coverage unit, where they've yielded 5.5 yards per return, third-lowest in the league.

- The only undrafted rookie to make the opening day 53-man roster, Quddus has beaten the odds coming out of Fordham and has seven stops and two forced fumble on coverage units.

- Acquired by the Saints in a trade from Miami prior to the start of training camp, Amaya's tied for first on the club with seven special teams tackles in 2011.
 - Casillas has made a successful comeback from a foot injury in 2010. In addition to seeing extensive action at outside linebacker, the former Wisconsin standout has recorded six special teams stops to rank second on the team, while also adding three sacks.
 - Charleston has recorded 32 special teams tackles in four seasons, finishing with seven stops in 2010, showing surprising coverage ability for his build.
 - In addition to handling lead blocker duties at fullback, Collins in his first full NFL season has four tackles and leads the team with 40 special teams blocks
 - Dunbar's started 22 games since coming to the club as an undrafted free agent in 2008 and has also been among their leaders with 35 special teams stops, including three in 2011. He has the ability to play all three linebacker positions.
 - One of two undrafted rookies who made the 2010 opening roster, Galette's posted six career stops, including two in 2011.
 - Hall, is a five-year NFL veteran who joined the Saints as an unrestricted free agent from Green Bay in 2011, where he recorded 52 special teams tackles, including leading the Super Bowl XLV champions with 15 stops in 2010. He's recorded four special teams stops in 2011.
 - In addition to serving as the club's starting strong safety since being drafted in 2006, Harper has also excelled in spot duty on special teams with 36 career stops during his career, including nine in 2010.
 - The size and speed that aids Herring at outside linebacker also assists him on special teams, where he's recorded 35 stops.
 - Humber led Indianapolis with 17 tackles as a rookie in 2009. He joined the Saints late in the 2010 season to add depth to the special teams units and has added three more stops after rejoining the club in week four.
 - Jenkins' combination of instincts and intelligence make him one of the club's most talented special teams players. He's recorded 12 tackles, two forced fumbles and a recovery.
 - Ranking among NFL leaders with two interceptions in 2011, Robinson, the club's 2010 first round pick has contributed four stops on coverage units. Robinson displayed his speed when he blocked an extra point attempt by the Panthers' **Olindo Mare** at Carolina, Oct. 9.
 - Roby has recorded 43 special teams stops in his six-year career. In 2011, he was voted the club's special teams captain by his teammates and is among the team's leaders with five stops to tie for fourth. In the season opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8, Roby sprung a key block for his cousin Sproles on a 72-yard punt return for a touchdown.
 - Shanle has recorded 34 career special teams tackles, including two in 2011, and is an eager participant down the sidelines when called into coverage duty.
 - Torrence is a five-year NFL veteran who enters his fourth season in New Orleans. He's been a contributor both in multiple DB packages, making 84 tackles (62 solo), 3.5 sacks, one interception and nine pass defenses to go with 61 special teams stops in his NFL career, including a team-leading eight in 2011.
 - One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2011, in addition to having the flexibility to play all three linebacker positions, Wilson has also contributed with four tackles on the club's coverage units.
- ### RETURN UNITS
- Sproles, in his first season in New Orleans serves as the club's primary kickoff and punt returner. He displayed his burst in the season opener at Green Bay, Sept. 8, when he had a 72-yard punt return for a touchdown and also had a 57-yard runback on a kickoff. For his career, Sproles has recorded three punt returns for touchdowns and has also brought two kickoffs into the end zone.
 - Moore has extensive experience in the punt return game to supplement Sproles, with the burst necessary for the position, averaging a club best 10.2 yards per return in 2010.
 - Roby reprised his role returning kickoffs in 2010. He ranks fourth all-time in club record books with a 25.6 kickoff return average.
 - Henderson and Meachem also have the ability and speed to handle kickoff returns. Henderson handled kickoff returns in the 2010 season finale and the play-off contest. Meachem also has experience on returns.

SAINTS HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

In just five seasons as Head Coach of the New Orleans Saints, Sean Payton's established himself as one of the most successful coaches in the NFL. Since coming to New Orleans, Payton has led the Saints to their first Super Bowl title and two division titles. During his tenure, he has compiled a 53-33 record and his teams have reached the postseason three times. Payton was hired as the 14th head coach in Saints history on Jan. 18, 2006 after being a member of the Dallas Cowboys staff since 2003. In 2011 he enters his 15th season in the NFL and 23rd in coaching.

In this five-year span, he holds the top winning percentage (.616) for a Saints coach all-time. No NFC team has won more than the 53 contests Payton has won during this period and only four AFC clubs have more. His 53 wins are the most during any five-year span in Saints history and tied for the second-most by an NFL coach during this period. He's posted a 4-2 (.667) mark in the postseason after the team had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival.

Serving as the club's play-caller, Payton's presided over the most prolific offense in the NFL, leading the league in yards per game three times and finishing first in scoring in 2008 and 2009. These are the only three times the Saints have led the NFL in total offense. In franchise history, the Saints have scored at least 45 points 10 times. Six of these outputs have occurred under Payton's watch.

In 2010 Payton led the Saints to their second straight postseason appearance and third in five seasons with an 11-5 record, becoming only the second Saints coach to post three double-digit win seasons. It was only the second time that the Saints had back-to-back seasons of at least 11 wins. The club had six road wins in 2010 as they had back-to-back winning records at visiting stadiums for the first time since 1991 and 1992. In fact, three of the top six road campaigns in team history (7-1 in 2009, 6-2 in both 2006 and 2010) have come under Payton. His regular season road winning percentage (25-15, .625) is tops in club history and the NFL's fourth-best over that period.

In 2009, en route to the Super Bowl XLIV title, Payton guided the Saints to the team's second NFC South title with a 13-3 record. Along the way the Saints set a franchise-record for most regular season wins (13). Their

16 overall victories were the most in franchise history. The Saints also posted the longest winning streak in team history when they won their first 13 contests. Payton was named as the top head coach in the NFL by numerous media outlets and recognized football chapters.

Payton scrapped the traditional timetable for rebuilding an NFL club in 2006. In his opening season, the Saints jumped out to a 3-0 record, equaling the team's win total from the previous year, and captured the NFC South title. New Orleans led the NFL in total offense, went to the postseason for the first time since 2000 and ad-

vanced to the NFC Championship for the first time. When 2006 came to a close, Payton was voted the Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* and several other media outlets.

Prior to his final season with the Cowboys, Payton was promoted to assistant head coach/passing game coordinator and was responsible for the team's play-calling. For the previous two years, he had been assistant head coach/quarterbacks coach.

Payton came to Dallas after four years with the New York Giants (1999-2002), the last three as offensive coordinator after spending his first season as quarterbacks coach. Payton solidified his reputation as one of the game's brightest offensive minds in 2000. In his first season as coordinator, the Giants captured the NFC title and went to Super Bowl XXXV.

Payton has had particular success tutoring quarterbacks. Drew Brees has thrived since arriving in New Orleans, as he holds or has tied a total of 19 club records. Since 2000, every passer under Payton's guidance has thrown for over 3,000 yards.

Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, then the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. The three-time AP All-American selection had professional stints with Chicago of the AFL, Ottawa of the CFL and the Chicago Bears in 1987. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a 2010 ceremony.

Born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton and his wife, Beth, have a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.
